



200 YEARS OF CATHOLIC EDUCATION



The Catholic Bishops have written a pastoral letter to school leaders, staff, students and families to mark the 200th anniversary of Catholic education in Australia which was launched on Thursday 18 February 2021.

The letter, <u>200 Years Young</u>, recognises the contribution of religious, clergy and lay people to the foundation of Catholic education, and the distinctive role Catholic schools play in educating and forming young people of faith and service in their communities.

Today, there are 1,751 Catholic schools educating 768,000 students and employing 98,000 staff. Nearly 40 per cent of Catholic schools are located outside of metropolitan cities in regional, rural and remote communities.

Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP, Chair of the Bishops Commission for Catholic Education, has called on all those involved in Catholic education to acknowledge this significant milestone in the life of the Church. Further information will be shared in the coming months about how Catholic Education South Australia will be celebrating this very special milestone.

- exercise financial stewardship of the school;
- ensure compliance with legal obligations.

Potential members of a School Board should:

- possess an enthusiasm for and willingness to promote the mission of Catholic schools;
- bring to the Board their gifts and skills;
- desire to give service to their school community;
- have an ability to work cooperatively and constructively with all members of the Board;
- be prepared to undertake formation;
- have an ability and desire to uphold confidentiality in Board matters;
- have sufficient time to devote to Board duties.

ASH WEDNESDAY

Last Wednesday was Ash Wednesday, which signified the beginning of Lent. Students and staff attended mass with Fr Ramel in our school hall, where ashes were sprinkled on individuals heads. During the special time of Lent, we prepare for the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ at Easter time.

SHROVE TUESDAY

Last Tuesday, we gathered together to eat pancakes on Shrove Tuesday. We sold over 130 pancakes, raising almost **\$90** for Project Compassion. Thank you to everyone that contributed to this fundraiser.



FUNDRAISING

In weeks 4 and 6 of Term 1, the Kids Café are hosting 'Fish Friday' and donating all proceeds to Project Compassion. On Fish Fridays, students can purchase 2 fish fingers and a bowl of rice for \$2 instead of the normal sausage in bread. Fruit boxes are still available for \$1.

PROJECT COMPASSION

Project Compassion runs through the six weeks of Lent every year. During Lent, we raise money for disadvantaged people all over the world. Each week, students learn about different people all over the world and how the work of Caritas Australia and Project Compassion has helped these individuals live fulfilling lives. This years the theme is, *Be More!* This week students and staff are learning about Margret from the Solomon Islands.

MARGRET FROM SOLOMON ISLANDS

Margret, 39, is a teacher at a vocational school for deaf students in the Solomon Islands. She was born deaf, so she knows the challenges it poses to education and employment.

The school faced water shortages for about half the year. Staff and students would walk for up to half an hour to collect water for drinking, cooking, washing and growing vegetables. Then in April 2020, amidst the threat of COVID-19, Tropical Cyclone Harold struck, damaging school buildings and its vegetable garden.

With Caritas Australia's support, Margret's school installed eight large water tanks and provided cyclone-proof materials to repair the damage. It also helped the school to implement COVID-19 prevention measures, providing fabric for students to make face masks.

Margret's school now has enough safe water to supply the school's population of 150 and has the capacity to cater for more students. It plans to boost food security, by increasing its agricultural production. This will improve nutrition and boost the school's income, while building resilience to future disasters.

Margret hopes that the school can aspire to 'Be More'.

"I am proud that our school community works together with Caritas Australia as our partner in ensuring that we live in a healthier environment," Margret says.


